3.1 TONS OF NON-PERISHABLE FOOD DONATED TO 20 LOCAL AGENCIES

CONCORD, NH — Twenty local social service agencies, area food pantries, and church groups were the recipients of over 3.1 tons of non-perishable food as part of the Capital Region Food Program's (CRFP) Year-Round Distribution Project in July.

Recipient agencies for the distribution included: Belknap/Merrimack Community Action Program, Blueberry Express Daycare, Boscawen Congregational Church Food Pantry, Boscawen Human Services, Centerpoint Pantry, Concord Human Services, Chichester Food Pantry, First Congregational Church, Friendly Kitchen, Friends of Forgotten Children, Gospel Light Church of God, Immaculate Conception Church, Loudon Food Pantry, Merrimack Valley Daycare, Pittsfield Food Pantry, St. John's Church – St. Vincent DePaul Society, St. Paul's Church Food Pantry, St. Peter's Church – St. Vincent DePaul Society, Suncook/Allenstown Community Action Program, and Webster Congregational Church Food Pantry.

As part of the Year-Round Distribution Project, the CRFP partners with Associated Grocers of New England to purchase and donate non-perishable food items such as canned fruit and vegetables, and peanut butter, breakfast cereal, rice, tuna, pasta, and beef stew eleven times annually to over thirty local agencies. In addition, the CRFP partners with the United Way of Merrimack County and the local U.S. Postal Carriers' Association each May to donate food collected through the U.S. Postal Carriers' "Stamp Out Hunger" food drive.

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The Capital Region Food Program, in association with social service agencies, area food pantries, and church groups, has been dedicated to the elimination of hunger in Greater Concord Area since 1974 through distribution of food to individuals and families.

On an annual basis, the CRFP distributes over 100 tons of food through two initiatives. Thirty-five (35) tons of food is distributed through the Year Round Distribution Project which is held eleven times a year. Sixty-five (65) tons of food is distributed through the program's Holiday Food Basket Project, held in partnership with the New Hampshire Army National Guard each December.
